### Introduction

The International English Language Testing System (IELTS) is widely recognised as a reliable means of assessing the language ability of candidates who need to study or work where English is the language of communication. These Practice Tests are designed to give future IELTS candidates an idea of whether their English is at the required level.

IELTS is owned by three partners, the University of Cambridge ESOL Examinations, the British Council and IDP Education Pty Limited (through its subsidiary company, IELTS Australia Pty Limited). Further information on IELTS can be found on the IELTS website (www.ielts.org).

#### WHAT IS THE TEST FORMAT?

IELTS consists of six components. All candidates take the see e List ning and Speaking tests. There is a choice of Reading and Writing tests according to whether a candidate is taking the Academic or General Training module.

#### Academic

For candidates wishing to study at undergraduate or postgraduate levels, and for those seeking professional registration.

#### Listening

This test consists of four sections, each with ten questions. The first two sections are concerned with social needs. The first section is a conversation between two speakers and the second section is a monologue. The final two sections are concerned with situations related to educational or training contexts. The third section is a conversation between up to four people and the fourth section is a monologue.

A variety of question types is used, including: multiple choice, matching, plan/map/ diagram labelling, form completion, note completion, table completion, flow-chart completion, summary completion, sentence completion, short-answer questions.

Candidates hear the recording once only and answer the questions as they listen. Ten minutes are allowed at the end for candidates to transfer their answers to the Linswe sheet.

#### **Academic Reading**

This test consists of three sections with 40 questions. There are three terms, which are taken from journals, books, magazines and newspapers. The texts are in topic; of general interest. At least one text contains detailed logical argument.

A variety of question types is used, including: multiple choice, fer in the information (True/False/Not Given), identifying writer's views/claims (Yes/No/Normatching information, matching headings, matching features, matching sentence and has sentence completion, summary completion, note completion, table completion, file inchart completion, diagram label completion, short-answer questions.

#### **General Training Reading**

This test consists of three sections with 40 ruestions. The texts are taken from notices, advertisements, leaflets, newspapers, ir atruction canuals, books and magazines. The first section contains texts relevant to back a uistic survival in English, with tasks mainly concerned with providing factual in armic and the section focuses on the work context and involves texts of magazines. The second section focuses on the work context and involves texts of magazines. The third section involves reading more extended texts, with a more concerned with the emphasis on descriptive and instructive rather than argumentative texts.

A variety of question, ne. is used, including: multiple choice, identifying information (True/False/Not Given), into ingoriter's views/claims (Yes/No/Not Given), matching information, matching headings, making features, matching sentence endings, sentence completion, summary completion, note completion, table completion, flow-chart completion, diagram label completion, short-answer questions.

#### **Academic Writing**

This test consists of two tasks. It is suggested that candidates spend about 20 minutes on Task 1, which requires them to write at least 150 words, and 40 minutes on Task 2, which requires them to write at least 250 words. Task 2 contributes twice as much as Task 1 to the Writing score.

Task 1 requires candidates to look at a diagram or some data (graph, table or chart) and to present the information in their own words. They are assessed on their ability to organise, present and possibly compare data, describe the stages of a process, describe an object or event, or explain how something works.
